Grants for Organizations that Support Dairy Sustainability

Competitive grant programs offer organizations, including co-ops, processors, non-profits, and universities, the opportunity to secure funding for research, education, and sustainability practice implementation. To receive funding, organizations submit proposals outlining their proposed projects, and funding is awarded based on a rigorous evaluation process that considers the merits of each proposal. If funded, organizations can leverage these public and private funding sources to increase the availability of technical and financial support for farmers and action toward industry goals.

KEY TAKEAWAYS

- **Understand the goals.** Funding programs have specific goals and objectives. The key to funding success is to ensure your proposal fits the grant objectives.
- **Understand the target grant recipient.** Some funding programs are designed to deliver funding directly to farmers, and NRCS provides the required technical assistance. Other funding programs deliver funding to organizations and NGOs to distribute to farmers. In this instance, the grant recipient usually is also responsible for administration, practice verification, funding distribution, etc.
- **Understand the geographic focus.** Most federal programs can be used anywhere in the U.S.; however, certain areas may have designated priority funding to address regional or state priorities. Other funding opportunities are administered on a regional level; in certain regions (e.g., Great Lakes, Chesapeake Bay), funding is available that is unique to that watershed.
- **Understand the reporting requirements.** All grants have different verification and reporting requirements; be sure to understand these requirements and budget time/resources to meet them.
- Combine funding sources and seek out partners. A successful sustainability research or implementation project will often leverage multiple funding sources. As different funding programs are designed to fund different activities, a project or initiative will often need to leverage funding from multiple grants or partners to be successful. Technical and financial support from partners and other funding sources can also be a good source of requisite "match" dollars.

KEY TERMS

Competitive Grant: Funding awarded based on a competitive evaluation process where proposals from individuals or organizations are assessed for merit and alignment with specified criteria. The financial award provided by a government agency, foundation, corporation, or entity for a specific purpose or project, with no expectation of repayment.

Cost-Share Program: Initiative requiring the grant recipient to contribute a specified percentage of the project's total costs. Cost share programs typically have a less rigorous application process but have clear guidelines that delineate what will be funded.

Financial Assistance (FA): Funding for equipment, supplies, planning, and infrastructure that support sustainable practice implementation.

Technical Assistance (TA): Expertise, support, and guidance that support sustainable practice implementation.

Match: A portion of project funding that the grant recipient must contribute from its own resources or non-federal sources to supplement the grant award. The match can be an *in-kind match* (paid or volunteer labor, supplies, administrative expenses, etc.) or *cash match* (monetary contributions).

Indirect: A portion of grant funds negotiated with funding agencies to cover indirect costs, such as overhead and administrative expenses, expressed as a percentage of the project's direct costs.

CIG On-Farm Conservation Innovation Trials (On-Farm Trials) support more widespread adoption and evaluation of innovative conservation approaches in partnership with agricultural producers. On-Farm Trials Awardees provide technical assistance and incentive payments to producers to help compensate for risks associated with the implementation of new conservation practices, systems, and approaches.	\$\$	On-farm Research							
USDA - Sustainable Agriculture Research and Education (SARE)									
Research & Education Grants program funds projects that result in gains in farmer knowledge, awareness, skills, and attitudes that are then applied to make measurable on-farm changes leading to greater sustainability.	\$	Research & Education							
Professional Development provides training, grants, and resources for agricultural professionals to build their awareness, knowledge, and skills related to sustainable agriculture concepts.	\$	Agricultural Service Provider Education
